The Healthy Greater Christchurch Interim Group had its first meeting earlier this month (May 2017).

Key points from the first meeting

- The group shared a strong, active willingness to work together. Participants agreed in the value of looking at working together across region.
- A draft Terms of Reference was drafted and tabled.
- The group identified several actions. A reference document for identifying general priorities and gaps is under way.
- Although the issue of geography is one of the reasons the group game together, the group agreed that specific geographical boundaries are unlikely to be useful. A name for an expanded initiative is still under consideration.
- The group is interested in monitoring outcomes and would prefer to use existing mechanisms where possible.

Why an Interim Group?

The <u>Greater Christchurch Partnership</u> identified Healthy Christchurch as a lead for the 'Health & Communities' stream of the <u>Urban Development Strategy</u>, along with the Selwyn and Waimakariri District Councils. This means we have an opportunity to formally strengthen and expand our network and enhance its regional relevance.

The Interim Group will formalise a decision about whether to expand the network or not. The group will also be tasked with developing a Terms of Reference for the next Advisory Group, developing a high-level work programme and continuing to engage with signatories throughout its processes.

Like the existing initiative, an expanded network would still lead new projects, be a vehicle for communication and consultation with communities, and provide a mechanism to be voice at decision making tables around the region.

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
