



The Healthy Greater Christchurch Advisory Group met on 28 November 2018.

Key points from the meeting

- Healthy Greater Christchurch has facilitated engagement with the Greater Christchurch Partnership's 'Our Space' Strategy. We will report back to participants about our analysis of the feedback received at our Integrated Planning workshop. We are happy to support signatories to prepare for participating in the hearings when they take place in February 2019.
- Planning is beginning for the 2019 Healthy Greater Christchurch hui. One part of this will be to officially launch the new name—Waka Toa Ora.

Why Healthy Greater Christchurch?

The [Greater Christchurch Partnership](#) identified Healthy Christchurch as a lead for the 'Health & Communities' stream of the [Urban Development Strategy](#), along with the Selwyn and Waimakariri District Councils.
